RANKS BECOMING SMALLER

It Will Not Be Many Years Be

Civil War Veterans Will All Have Gone

The rapid rate at which the veter final call which musters them out of the ranks of the living, has been no-ted by Corporal James Tanner, com-mander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, and he declares that every twenty-four hours records the death of 164 of the boys who went at their country's call and assisted in preserving the integrity of the napreserving the integrity of the na-tion. According to the commander-lochief, there are now less than 20,000 of them left. At this time the rate is 101 every day. During the year ending June 15, 1905, the number of men who were receiving pensions from the government for their particfrom the government for their participation in the great civil war, who passed away, was 43,855. In relation to pensions, torporal Tanner said that the present session of congress will be asked to amend the pension law by which every man who served at least three months in the army in the civil war and was homorably discharged will receive \$12 a month instead of \$5 a month, the sum now paid. It is intended that this increase shall also apply to widows' pensions.

Public Ownership's Trial Ground A political movement similar to o now under considerable headway in this country has made rapid progress in Australia, and if the hopes of the Labor purty there are not dashed by reverse the commonwealth is likely to give the world the first example, in on a public or government or "colle tive" ownership plan. An account on a public or government or "collec-tive" ownership plan. An account of the progress and purposes of the La-bor party in Australia presented in the Nineteenth Century by J. W. Kir-wan, a member of the federal house of representatives, is interesting and pertinent at this time. Mr. Kirwan says that in the commonwealth the trades unions have become "semipoli-tical bodies." Candidates for partia-ment are first selected by bailots of members of the unions and are re-quired to sign a pledge "to carry out the principles embedied in the Pederal Labor, platform." Western Australian government has a monopoly of telephone and telegraph service as well as the post. Old,
age pensions are now paid in Victoria
and New South Wales, and the Labor
