## FELL OFF WAGON, IS DEAD

Death in Strange Clanner Near Dundee Last Saturday.

Carl Sheuer, living near Dandee, was found dead in the readshife Saturday, death being undeubtedly caused by a stroke of apoplexy.

The deceased had gone to Dendee Saturday evening in company with Frank Schope, an employ of Charles Helm, and the latter's son. When on the return trip they neared home Schope missed Sheuer, who had been riding on the milk cars, in the rea of the wagon. They finished their trip liome and in company with Mr. Helm informed to look for Mr. Sheuer. They found him dead in the read 60 rots from where he was-aissed. They immediately notified Wm. Rodnieger, a san-le-law of Sieuer, and together they removed the body to the home of Rodmeyer.

Dr. Kerch was called and gave his opinion that death was caused by apoplexy, and that Sheuer was unconscious if not dead, when he fell from the wagon. Owing to the circumstances, Dr. Kerch consulted the coroner's office, who decided an inquest was unrecessay.
