A surrey of the water front from a tug aboved that everything except four docks had been swept elean from Fisherman's wharf, at the foot of Powell street, to a point around westerly, almost to the Ferry building. This means that nearly a mile of grain sheds, docks and wharres have been added to the general destruction. The fire was still burning at the foot of Powell street, but there was no possibility of it going into the Presidio district.
