This is the secret of the whole thing. It depends altogether on how much is left in a man as to whether his first have burned out or are still alive. What the employer wants is vituality, resourcefulness, alertness, freshness and openness of mind. It does not matter so much about the years, It is rather a question of energy, of reserve powe. It is folish to fix an age at which men become comparatively useless. Some men are young at 70, others are old at 35. One of the worst deulsions that ever crept into a middle-aged man's mind is the conviction that he has done his best work, that he is growing of any ourself to be influenced by Dr. Osler's "fixed ideas," for he is himself, at 55, a direct contradiction of his own theory.
