AN APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE. NO. 14, NEW SERIES.

An ordinance making appropriations
for the corporate purposes for the
fiscal year beginning May 1, 1906,
and ending April 30, 1907, for the
Village of Barrington, counties of
Cook and Lake, state of Illinois.
Be it ordained by the President and
Board of Trustees of the Village of
Barrington:

SECTION 1. That the following sums
or so much thereof as may be author-
ized by law, and as may be needed, be
and the same are hereby appropriated
for the purpose of paying the corpo-
rate expenses of the Village of Bar-
rington, as hereinafter specified for
the fiscal year commencing May 1,
1906, and ending April 30, 1907:

For paying the contingent
expenses of said village the sum of.....\$500 00
For the purpose of making,
maintaining and improving
the streets, sidewalks
and drainage of and in said
village, the sum of.....4,000 00
For salaries of police officers
for the fiscal year.....1,000 00
For the salaries of village
officers.....300 00
For the maintenance of
street lighting.....1,000 00
For the payment of interest
on the bonded indebtedness
of said village the sum of.....450 00
For the purpose of maintain-
ing and providing for wa-
ter in said village the sum
of.....2,000 00
For the purpose of paying
balance of Flora B. Meyer
judgment.....600 00

Total for corporate pur-
poses.....\$10,150 00

SECTION 2. That the unexpended bal-
ance of any item or items of any general
appropriation made by this ordinance
may be expended in making up any
insufficiency in any item or items in
said general appropriation, and for the
same general purpose or in a like
appropriation made by this ordinance.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be
in full force and effect from and after
its passage and publication according
to law.

AN ORDINANCE. NO. 15, NEW SERIES.

For the regulation of the use and
operation of automobiles on or in the
public thoroughfares of the Village
of Barrington, Counties of Cook and
Lake and State of Illinois.
Be it ordained by the President and
Board of Trustees of the Village of
Barrington:

SECTION 1. (Definition and Terms.)
For the purposes of this ordinance the
terms or names "automobile," "auto-
car," and "other similar vehicles,"
wherever and whenever used in this
ordinance, shall be held to embrace
and mean, and are hereby defined to
mean, any vehicle driven or propelled
upon or along the streets, alleys or
other public ways of the village,
whether for purposes of business or
pleasure, or for both, the motive power
of which is electricity, compressed air,
naphtha, gasoline, kerosene, steam or
other motive power other than animal
power or motive power supplied solely
by the muscular exertion of a human
being; provided, however, that nothing
herein shall apply to the operation of
any locomotive, grip car, trolley car or
other vehicle used by any street or
street railway upon or along any track
or tracks owned or lawfully used by
any street or street railway company
unless so expressly stated.

SECTION 2. (Speed Regulations.)
No automobile, autocar or other sim-
ilar vehicle shall be propelled or driven
upon or along any street, alley or pub-
lic way in the village at a speed ex-
ceeding ten miles per hour when pre-
ceding in a direct course, nor at a
speed exceeding four miles per hour
when turning any street corner, and
the operator of such vehicle, when
such vehicle is in motion, shall ob-
serve the rules of the road as pre-
scribed in this ordinance for other
vehicles.

SECTION 3. (Alarm Bell, Brakes,
Lamps, Etc.) Machinery Not to Run
While Vehicle is Standing.) Every
automobile, autocar or other similar
vehicle driven or propelled upon or
along any street, or public way, in the
village shall be equipped and supplied
with an alarm horn, bell or gong of
not more than four inches in diameter,
and the same shall be sounded at street
crossings and wherever and whenever
else deemed advisable, by the operator
of such vehicle, to be sounded for the
purpose of notifying pedestrians or
others of the approach of any such
vehicle. Each automobile, autocar or
other similar vehicle shall be equipped
with at least two brakes or sets of
brakes, one of which brakes or sets of
brakes shall be independent of the
steering gear of such vehicle when con-
struction will permit. Either of such
brakes or sets of brakes shall be of
sufficient power, when applied, to
bring any such vehicle, when at a
speed of ten miles per hour, to a full
stop within ten feet from the point
where such vehicle was when the
brake was applied; and all such vehi-

cles shall carry a lighted lamp or
lamps, in a conspicuous position there-
on, whenever in motion on any street,
alley, or public way, and such lamps
shall be kept lighted during the pe-
riod commencing with April 1st and
ending October 31st, from 8 p. m. to
daybreak; and during the period com-
mencing November 1st and ending
March 31st, from 6 p. m. to daybreak.
No part of the machinery of any au-
tomobile, autocar or other similar ve-
hicle shall be permitted to run while
such vehicle is standing in any street,
alley or public way, without an attend-
ant.

All automobiles, autocars or other
similar vehicles, when in use on the
streets, shall have and keep lighted a
lamp or lamps or a lantern or lanterns,
from sunset to daybreak, which shall
throw a red light directly to the rear
of the machine, and a white light on
each side of the machine, in such a man-
ner as to make such letters or numbers
plainly visible and legible during the
hours specified.

SECTION 4. (Register of Owner's
Number.) Each such vehicle shall
carry and display a number or num-
bers, which shall be painted on the
ship of said vehicle, such num-
bers or letters to be painted on signs
or plaques of metal, metal or leather
of dark color or directly on the vehicle
itself. Such numbers or letters shall be
displayed on the rear of the vehicle in
plain sight as near the center as pos-
sible in the middle thereof. Such
numbers or letters shall be five-eighths
of an inch wide at every point, and
such numbers or letters shall be
placed at least three-fourths of an inch
apart. Any person desiring to operate
or use an automobile, autocar, or other
similar vehicle in the Village shall re-
gister the same together with the
name and address of such owner with
the Village Clerk, in a book to be kept
for such purposes and in the event of
such number or letters having been
adopted and registered by any other
person, the said applicant shall so
alter or change his number or let-
ters indicating ownership, such as to
make a distinction between the number or letters adopted
by such person and the number or let-
ters adopted by any other person
on the register. Each person so
applying for the registration of his
number or letters denoting ownership
shall pay to the Village Clerk, at the
time of so applying, the sum of one
dollar.

SECTION 5. (Rule of the Road.)
That whenever any person or persons
travelling in automobiles, carriages,
or other conveyances shall meet on any
street, alley or public way in the vil-
lage, the person so meeting shall
seasonably turn the conveyance to the
right of the way on which he is travel-
ing, so as to permit each conveyance to pass without
interfering or interrupting; provided
that this section shall not be con-
structed to apply to any case where it
is impracticable from the nature of the
ground for the driver or operator of
the conveyance to turn to the right of
the beaten track.

SECTION 6. (Penalty.) Any per-
son violating any provision of the
second, third, fourth and fifth sec-
tions of this ordinance shall be fined
not less than five (\$5) dollars nor more
than twenty-five (\$25) dollars for each
offense.

SECTION 7. (Accidents.) Any per-
son who, while riding, driving, oper-
ating or propelling a bicycle, motorcycle,
automobile, carriage, wagon or other
vehicle, shall ride, drive, operate or
propel any such vehicle upon or over
any person upon the public highway,
or the property of any person in his
personal possession or use, so as to
cause any injury or damage to such
person or property, and who shall not
stop at once to ascertain the condition
of such injury, and to render such as-
sistance as may be needed, and who
shall refuse to give his true name and
residence, or who shall give a false
name or residence when asked for by
the person so injured, or by any other
person in his behalf, shall be fined not
less than five (\$5) dollars nor more than
one hundred (\$100) dollars for each of-
fense.

SECTION 8. (Intoxicated Person Not
to Operate Automobile, Etc.) No per-
son while in a state of intoxication
shall operate, conduct, manage,
control or have charge of any grip car,
automobile, motor car, or other vehicle
propelled by mechanical power, upon
any of the public streets or ways within
the Village while such vehicle is in
motion, or while the machinery or any
part thereof of any such vehicle is in
motion.

Every person violating any of the
provisions of this section shall be fined
not less than one hundred (\$100) dol-
lars and not more than two hundred (\$200)
dollars for each offense.

SECTION 9. (All ordinances or parts of
ordinances conflicting with this ordi-
nance be and the same are hereby re-
pealed.)

SECTION 10. This ordinance shall be
in force from and after its passage and
publication according to law.
