
Rules by Which the Quantity in the Pile May Be Accurately Ascertained.

od rule for the measurer hay in stacks is recommended by the Rural New Yorker, and is as follows: Mean length, times mean width, times mean height to shoulder; plus length, times mean height of ridge above shoulder, times one-all the mean width at the shoulder equals the

CULTIVATING CORN CROP.

The Methods Should Vary with the Weather and the Character of the Season.

SENATORS DECLARE THEY BEN-

Contend National Treasury Sho Not Be Burdened with Expens Belonging Properly to Dealers.

Washington. — Senator Proctor Wednesday called up in the senate the agricultural appropriation bill, and made the usual motion for agreement to the request for a confessore. He then made a statement concerning the house substitute for the meat inspection, received, assale that there were house substitute for the meat inspec-tion provision, saying that there were we essential points of difference be-tween the two houses. One of these, he said, was the omission by the house of the senate provision requiring that the date of inspection be placed on cams containing meat and the other the transfer of the cost of inspectiop from the packers to the national treas-ury.

Speaking of the latter change, he said that it was radical and, in his opinion, unwise and advised that the house amendment on that point he not accepted. The packers could, he declared, afford the expense as an advertisement, for, looked at in that light, the government certificate would be of immense benefit. Senator Procetor also charged that the numerous protests which have been coming to the senate on this subject have a common origin in Chicago, and in support of his statement read a number of protests to show the language to be practically the same wherever they may be date.

Senator Beveridge agreed with Senator Proctor as to the unwisdom of the house changes in the matter of the house changes in the matter ton, but the provision for night surveillance had been retained. The two essential changes he considered as most important, declaring that if the date is not to be used it will be possible to pass off as fresh meat that which may have been inspected five years ago. He said that the date is stamped on meat shipped abroad and argued that the same plan should be pursued with reference to meat consumed at home.

Senator Lodge declared the conditions described by Messra. Nell and Reynolds were true at the time they were written, and Senator Hamsbrough read a telegram which said the writter had visited one of the big packing houses in Chicago and had found the walls of the killing room covered with damp kalsomine, showing that, an attempt had been made recently to clean up.
