BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CASI How Col. Picquart Paid for Wanting

a Square Deal.

Captain Aireal Dreyfus, of the artiblery, a member of a wealthy Hebrew family of Ajace, where he was born in 1859, was on Oct. 14, 1894, arrested on the charge of communicating French military secrets to a foreign power. Two months later Dreyfus was tried by court martial and found guilty, and Jan. 5 he was publicly degraded and deported to Devil's Island, near Caysono, Fraceh Gulana, there apparently to spend the remainder of his life. The friends and relatives of Dreyfus, motably his wife, always believed in his innecesses, and devoted all their his innecesses, and devoted all their his interest, and the control of the his interest, and the control of the his interest, and the head of the histolicans of the proceedings against Dreyfus and questioned the correctioness of the proceedings, and continuing his investigations formed the opinion that the evidence pointed to Major Count Esterhary as being the guilty man.
