The mean temperature averaged slightly above normal throughout the week, and there was but little variation from day to day. The highest temperature, 85 degrees, occurred at Rantoul on the 10th and Bloomington, on the 12th, and the lowest, 52 degrees, was recorded at Lanark on the 9th. The sunshine averaged 68 per cent in the central, and 55 in the southern. Beneficial showers occurred in many localities throughout the state on the 12th and 13th, with heavy rains in some of the eastern counties; but the week's rainfall was very local in character, and droughty conditions still obtain in some sections, especially over western half of the state. Destructive hallstorms were reported from portions of Iroquois county on the 12th.
