Rurual Carriers Prohibited From Delivering Mailable Matter Outside the Mails.

Complaint is made to the Department that rural carriers, at the request of patrons of their routes, call at express offices for packages of mailable matter and deliver same outside of the mails to the patrons and receive mall fees for the service

Postmasters at rural delivery offices are directed to inform rurual carriers that they must not carry, as express that they must not carry, as express matter, for hire or as a favor, any article or package weighing four pounds or under, which is mailable, and carriers will inform their pafrons and carriers with inform their pairons that such packages can only be de-livered by them after the required postage shall have been affixed to such packages.
