Are You Registered.

Tuesday, October 30th, is the last day of registration. The law in the country is different from that for the city of Chicago. The registration board here have the right to place the names of all persons whom they know to be voters in their township on such list without the voter appearing in person. Bear in mind that this board is allowed only to put on names of those that they know to be voters.

This registration takes place every two years and many changes occur, which are not always familiar to the board.

board. Last, Tuesday was the first day of registration and a list of names of the voters of each township in the state was compiled on that day. A copy of this is posted in some conspicuous plac in the township.

It is your duty as a citizen to examine the list and see as to whether your name appears on the register. If it does not you should notify one of the members of the board (their names appear on the last page of the list) be appear on the last page of the list) be-fore the next day of registration, Tues-day. October 30th, or appear before them on that day for the purpose of having them add your name to the corrected list made that day. The hours for registration are from 9 o'clock a. m. to 4 o'clock p. m.
