He called on one of our leading merchants and purchased a \$1.25 shirt, presenting a pay cheek supposed to have been issued by the Chicago Crushed Stone Co., and signed H. B. Wontgromer, The check was made payable to Aug. Myers, and called for \$1.400. It was drawn on the Chicago Title & Trust Co., and hore every evidence of being genuine. He tendered it for payment and was given to Chicago for collection it was returned as "no good," with \$2.00 protest charges attached, which the merchant had to pay.
