Mall Service in the United States.

William E. Curtis has compiled some very interesting statistics re-garding the growth and development of the rural mail service in the United States. Among other things he shows that Illimois heads the list of states of money expended, with Ohio a close second. The latter state, on account of being more densely populated, has the greatest number of samilies

served.

On the 30th of June last there were 32,055 rural carriers on the road. Since then, up till the first of Junuary, 2,095 have been appointed, making a total of 34,660. Of these 250 are women, some of whom have been employed for a number of years.
