"Kingston was overwhelmed by an earthquake Monday afternoon at 3:30. All the houses within a radius of ten miles have been damaged and almost every house in the city is destroyed. Fire broke out after the earthquake and completed the work of destruction. It is estimated that 100 persons have been killed and 1,000 injured. The public offices and hospitals are in rulas. Among the killed are Sir James Fergusson, many prominent merchants and professional men and a great many natives. There were no fatalities at the Constant Springs hotel.
