He detailed to the Jury his observations and examinations of Harry Thaw duping eight visits to the prisoner in the Tombs, and declared it to be his opinion that Thaw was suffering from "a brain storm or an explosive or failminating condition of mental unsoundness" at the time

ited him. He said Thaw exhibited symptoms of paranola and adolescent insanity. The first was 'indicated by his exaltation, his "exaggrated ego"— the idea of his supreme importance. The adolescent insanity was due to heredity and is characteristic to the development period of life—from 10 to 40 years.
