The vote in Barrington numbered 273 and the results were as follows: for supervisor, A. H. Boehmer, 227; assessor, J. C. Plagge, 217; clerk, J. F. Gieske, 220; collector, W. C. Harnden, 111; T. H. Gould, 192; J. Brinker, 55; Humphrey, 224; school treasurer, F. L. Waterman, 225. The vote on judge of the Superior court was: Ben Smith. rep., 186; Wm. Witty, dem., 45; Wm. indee: W. H. McSurley, rep., 172; Wm. Dever, dem., 20; Walter Caddick, prob., 28; T. J. Morgan, socialist. 7.
