St. Paul, Minn.—One of the boldest and most successful robberies which has been perpetrated in this city for many years occurred Toesday night when a clerk in the Union depot office of the Northern Express company was held up at the point of a pistol, compelled to open the safe and take therefrom a package containing \$25,000 in currency, with which the robber made his escape.

About half past ten a young man who is believed to have been a pail of the robber called at the express office and by some pretext managed to get one of the clerks out of the office for a short time. Fred Zimmerman, the other clerk, soon afterwards found himself confronted by a masked robber who pointed a pistol at his head.

Former United States Senator to Test Its Constitutionality.

Lincoin, Neb. — Former United States Senato William V. Allen States Senator States Senator Allen is one of the fusion leaders of the state who has opposed the primary law from the outset. Either an injunction suit or a quo warranto proceeding will be filed. Senator Allen said:

"There are several unconstitutional features, the chief one of which is that the law requires a voter to disclose his party identity. This infringes the Australian ballot principle of severey in voting and is to that extent a restriction of suffrage, which the constitution forbids."

South Dakota Elections.
Sioux City, Ia.—Municipal elections were held throughout South Dakota Tuseday, the prevailing issue being liquor license. Returns indicate little change in the present standing of the prohibition and saloon forces. In Sioux Falls the principal issue was on the granting of a 39-year franchise for the construction and operation of a street railway system, which was ratified by a vote of 5 to 1.
