

WOMEN AND SONS OF SPAIN.—A war, Philippine Insurrection and Boxer uprising in other than poster's mind, at expense not to exceed \$25. Providing for the payment by the state of 40 per cent. of premiums of county fairs and agricultural societies. Giving city council powers of highway commissioners when commissioners have been selected. Vesting an appointment of supervisor of poor with county board instead of city council. Requiring state's attorney to give ten days' notice before bringing suit against corporation, for failure to make affidavit that it is not member of trust, as required by anti-trust law. Empowering regular secondary associations to organize for the purpose of their sick and distressed members and families. Fixing limit of recovery for death in mine accident at \$10,000. At present limit is \$5,000.

Protection of Game Fish. General law for the protection of game fish. Provides for fish warden in each county, three salaries members fish commission at \$2,500. Strict regulations as to use of seines and nets, closed seasons fixed, fishing through ice prohibited.

Removing the \$200,000 bond limitation on the statutory annual district, increasing the tax levy from one-half to one per cent.

Repealing statute requiring owners of traction engines to carry heavy planing for protection of bridges, and requires county commissioners to protect the bridges.

Giving county and municipal authorities power to appropriate for publication of proceedings and documents of historic interest and mark location of ancient forts, villages, etc.

Requiring insurance companies to show on face of each policy that it is secured by pledge of bonds, stocks and securities deposited, equal to the amount of the legal reserve.

Establishing a state board of equity and regulating, licensing and examination of officers.

Providing for the distribution of interest and profits on public funds and investments among the townships of the county.

Prohibiting the killing of fur-bearing animals between March 1 and December 1.

Assessment for Pumping Plants. Permitting an assessment not exceeding one cent on lots on lands of drainage districts for erection and maintenance of pumping plants and necessary repairs to drain ditches and levees of districts.

Permitting municipalities to cooperate with other towns in same county in making public improvements, proportionate cost to be determined by court.

Giving state board of five stock commissioners power of condemnation of diseased cattle, dogs, etc.

Requiring life insurance companies incorporated in other states to deposit securities to amount required of companies incorporated in Illinois, or a certificate showing such deposit in home state.

Providing for chief grain inspector of state, and giving railroad and warehouse commissioners general supervision over class "A" warehouses. In Chicago requires inspection of grain both on receipt and delivery by grain inspector. Deputy inspectors to be appointed by chief grain inspector.

Permits admission to soldiers and sailors home at Quincy of aged water of soldiers and sailors.

Relief for Indigent Veterans. Making act of relieving the suffering of relief to indigent civil war veterans and their families apply to those who served in Philippine insurrection, Spanish-American war and Boxer uprising in China.

Providing for organization of state militia into division under command of major general and raises rank of adjutant general as well as major general. Reorganization of naval reserve in command of captain and makes number of other changes in the code.

Allowing mine operators to take into mine sufficient explosives for next day's use, prohibits mine operators from packages of explosives with picks, makes former provisions for depth of shaft holes, amount of explosive to be used, etc.

Making charging of shot holes a misdemeanor by shot fire penitentiary offense if accident results.

Providing for protection of bridge and structural iron work. Requires safeguarding of floors, scaffolding, belting.

Regulation of State Banks. Regulating state banks. Gives state auditor power of summary possession of bank under suspension pending application for receiver. Allows depositors to petition for receiver, who shall reside in same county. Prohibits loans to officers except on approval of directors, guards against "dummy" directors, etc.

Giving person furnishing monument or grave-stone a lien on stone until paid for.

Requiring three days' notice of application to declare a person a pauper.

Requiring mutual life insurance companies in determining amount of surplus to be distributed to reserve amount equal to not less than aggregate net value of outstanding policies.

Making petition of one-tenth of voters affected the legal proposition necessary for submission of proposition for annexation of territory to municipality.

Making Illinois citizenship a qualification of mine examiners. Allows mine owners to employ expert exceed men when impossible to secure services of certificated mine examiners.

Giving state board of health authority to license physicians to receive application who have been licensed in other countries or states, provided

same privilege is given to those states. Requiring state registration of all automobiles—fixing limits of speed (30 miles an hour on country roads, making injury to person or property prima facie evidence of violation of speed limit regulations).

For Protection of Plants. Requiring state, entomologist to prescribe prophylactic measures if he finds survey of insects infested by contagious plant disease and empowering him to withhold certificate of inspection if conditions imposed have not been observed.

Making it unlawful to wear badge of G. A. R. Spanish war veterans of Army of Philippines unless person satisfied to wear it.

Fixing salary judges state board of equalization at \$1,000 a year instead of a per diem as now provided and providing for per diem payment of needed clerks.

Increasing salaries of legislators to \$7,000 a year, with \$5 per diem for extra sessions.

Establishing a state printed institution for children, creating a board of trustees for same, appropriating \$25,000 for the establishment.

Establishing an educational commission to report to the next general assembly means for uniform text books and other necessary expenses. Appropriates \$10,000 for expenses.

Limiting salaries of life insurance officials to \$5,000 unless more is authorized by directors.

Revising state banking law. Limiting amount institution can loan to one person, firm or corporation to 10 per cent. of its combined capital and unimpaired surplus.

Increasing Salaries. Increasing salaries of state officers. Requiring strict verification, drainage and other sanitary precautions in buildings and rooms used for manufacturing and ice cream.

Including among the securities to be deposited by insurance companies with the superintendent of insurance certificates of deposit issued by any national banking association or trust company, certificates of purchase acquired through foreclosure proceedings instituted by it upon mortgages in which its funds have been lawfully invested and duly recorded conveyances of unencumbered real estate.

Taking from county almshouses in some persons and placing them in state institutions at state expense.

Providing for the changing of the name of the "asylum for the incurable insane" at Burlington to "Illinois General Hospital for the Insane."

Providing that cities may pass ordinances requiring money for building bridges and maintaining water works. Exempting from the provisions of the franchise act children between the ages of 14 and 16 necessarily employed during school hours.

Prohibiting any person under 18 years of age from smoking cigarettes in public, except \$100 fine for selling cigarettes, containing anything deleterious to health, other than tobacco.

Authorizing cities of over 3,000 population having paid fire departments to establish firemen pension fund.
