Longest and Heaviest Steel One In the World.

TO SPAN THE EAST RIVER.

rtistic Structure at New York Will Link New England and the South, Four Tracks, Two For Passenger and Two For Freight Service.

Plans for the how York Connecting railread were filed recently with the numbered were filed recently with the numbered art complision for its auproval, in accordance with the provisions of the charter granted to tree company, says the New York Trilium. The new bridge will surprise all ever built or planned to cross the East river and will be the longest and heaviest steel bridge in the world. First or all the bridges to meet the eye of the passenger from the sound three years from now, it will sweep in a graceful curve over Heil story in the sound three years from now, it will sweep in a graceful curve over Heil Handall's island and the Bronx kills. When it is completed and the last spike driven in the four railroad tracks to cross it, for the first time there will be an all rail route through New York between New England and the south.
