With the opening of the public schools the results of the new compulsory school law, which has raised obligatory school age to skreen years is to be foreshadowed. The last legislature increased this maximum age two years, Insteador children being allowed to quit school and go to work at 14. as hadjeen done, they will now have to go to school two years longer, unless circumstances of dire necessity force them to, labor.
