Chemist Are Recognized.

Stockholm.—The Nobel prise for chemistry will be awarded to Sir William Crookes, of London.

Sir William Crookes discovered thallism, an element, in 1851, and invented the radiometer in 1874. He was knighted in 1897 and has been closely identified with many of the most inportant advances in science. Prof. Crookes recently discovered a process of extracting nitric acid from the atmosphere, which it was anounced would soom be available for commercial, industrial and agricultural purposes and would revolutionise the nitrate industry and the world's food problem.
