itself. So much depends upon the man.

It is neccessary that the farmer keep accounts and know the cost of production, that he may be able to figure out methods of cheaper production. The man who finds that there is 'non morey in farming" and says, "i'm going to quit," doesen't think, or he doesn't keep accounts.

By running over the work book at the end of the season, we can easily get the number of days spent in working each field, and with the price few man and per horse, can figure the foost of the erop grown in that field. There is certain labor on the farm which must be charged to the place as general expense and not per acre to any crop; for instance, a forty-acre field of corn may have four sides fenced: this fence is not for the benefit of the corn, but for the purpose of keeping lite stock, and it should be charged to the live stock. We found it was more expensive to rake and hurn stalks than it was to did sit he land.
