"Internal Revenue" Collections.

The torm "Internal, revenue" has been restricted in its meaning to such revenues only as are collected under the internal revenue bureau connected with the treasury department, and does not include all revenues that are, properly speaking, from internal sources, that is, from sources other than dutte leviced at the frontiers moneys arising from the sale of public lands, from patent fees, or the revenues of the postal service, are not generally known as "Internal revenues."
