The act of congress which recently went into opention granting to certain employees of the United States compensation for injuries sustained in the course of service is a measure of considerable importance in the domain of labor legislation.

The new have applies to persons employed by the government as artisans or laborers in the following services: Arsenais, may yants, river and have to construction, fortification construction, hazardous employment in the control of the construction and in control or management of works—bazardous employment and its control of the construction and its control or management employees come within the previous of the law. Compensation will be paid under this act only for such lajaries to an employee as occur in the course of his employment and cause inability to pursue his employment for more than fifteen days. 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
