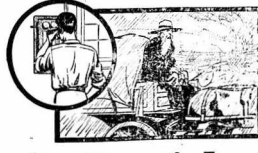

FARM and GARDEN

TRAINING THE TOMATO VINES
Practiced by Faw, but? Done in Minnesota's Will Grady Increase Yield of Fruit.

Very few amateurs practice training tomato vines, but it is this in midsummer the yield of the fruit is very greatly increased. The extensive experiments at various training stations have developed the fact that the increase due to training is...

fruit is great. At the Maine station this method has increased the yield to ten per cent and the gain in weight is per cent.

The plants were grown under early field culture and they were placed in the greenhouse, April 1st, planted in the beds June 1st and headed back July 20th. August 15th and 16th...

of course in winter climates the work should be done earlier. Each summer, the leading branches were shortened about six inches and most of the side shoots below the first clusters were removed. The other being shortened, and the night was thus freely admitted.

Training tomatoes, when to put from five to ten feet high, becomes common practice. This method increases the yield, as the sunlight reaches all the fruit and makes picking much easier.

It is not difficult to train vines in this way and it can be done in an ordinary garden by means of wire.
