SORRY HE COMMITTED CRIME

Walks to Jail Refusing Life Lease as Admission of Guilty Remorse.

TAR MEN TO JAIL

FOUR WHOY ACKNOWLEDGED GUILT ARE GIVEN ONE YEAR.

Two Guilty, One Acquitted in Trial of Three Charged With Attack on Kansas Teacher.

Lincoln Center, Kan.—The three men who were indicted in the shooting of Miss Mary Chamberlain, the school teacher, were sentenced to a year each by Judge Gray. They are G. Clark, Jay Fletcher and Warren S. Stratton.

St. Charles, Mo. Judge Gray sentenced the three men to the place of the attack on, who already has been 70 days in jail, also was given a year.

The three were told that they would be given single time to arrange their business affairs before being committed. None of the men seemed surprised at the action of the court. They think parole will be granted after they have served a short time. It is said.

The jury in the case of Sheriff Clark, John Schmidt and A. M. Rizzio, who admitted knowledge of the attack but denied participation in it, returned Clark and Schmidt from jury's acquittal and Rizzio from jury's conviction.

Defense attorney Paul and the indictment was not accepted. He filed a motion for the defense for a new trial, which was granted.

The jury proceeded in a methodical manner taking the evidence in the case. It was decided that, although not present at the actual shooting, Clark had furnished the shotgun used in the shooting of Miss Mary Chamberlain and had been one of the conspirators.

ACCUSED OF ROOSEVELT HURT

Mrs. Von Gleason Unable to Attend Hearing as Her Nanny Rescued of Broken Ankle.

New York.—Mrs. Von Gleason, whose spectacular accusations of the late Roosevelt and other prominent persons have brought her much notoriety in the last few days, was unable to attend the hearing of a commission appointed to inquire into her story because she is suffering from a broken ankle.

She is in the hospital in the city. In trying to escape from the Bloomingdale insane asylum, where she has been confined for some time, she fell from a second-story window, sustaining the injury to her ankle. Mrs. Von Gleason was committed primarily because of a threatened interview with the press to a Supreme court justice from Chicago.

THIRTY KILLED IN PLUNGE

Entire Passenger Train Falls with Bridge in France into Flood.

Paris—Thirty passengers got their lives by the breaking away of a bridge over which a train was passing when the bridge collapsed into the Seine.

The train, which was bound from Angers to Poitiers, carried 100 passengers. The bridge over the Thouet river, the structure, which had been weakened by recent floods, gave way, sending the entire train into the swollen stream.
