The total of the Titanic's surrivors was officially placed at 705 by W. W. Jeffries, general passenger agent of the White Star line. He accepts the statement of the Carpathia as to the number of the surrivors, giving them by cabine as follows: First class, 202; second class, 115; third class, 175; crew, 205; officers, 4; total, 798.
