It is announced that unless friends rally to_the support of its finances; it will be obliged to liquidate. Letters setting forth the situation have been sent to all stockholders by officers of the association. The total indebtness of the agricultural association is said to be about \$5000. The receipts of this year's fair were sufficient to meet expenses but did not leave a balance to apply on the debt. Officers, declare that if liquidation becomes necessary creditors would receive not more than than 25 pents on the dollar.
