Five persons are dead and scores injured, some seriously, following a rearend collision on the main line of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad opposite the passenger depot at Stamford, Conn.

In a night attack upon the remaining defenses of the rebellious Moros on the island of Jolo, the American troops under Brig. Gen. John J. Pershing, U. S. A., routed the rebel Filipinos with the loss of six men killed and seren wounded. All the American soldiers killed were scouts.

A large delegation of suffragettes and thousands of spectators witnessed the interment of the body of Emily Wilding Davison in St. Mary's churchyard. Miss Davison was killed in an attempt to top the king's horse on Derby day, and her funeral at London was made the occasion of a great demonstration by suffragettes.

Earthquakes were renewed in many parts of Bulgaria. The selsmic disturbances at Tirnova continue. Many persons were killed. Thousands are homeless and destitute.

Many arrests have been made in connection with the assassination of Shefket Pasha at Constantinople. One of the alleged conspirators in the hands of the authorities is Gen. Salio Pasha, a former sid to the sultan.
