### WORD IMPRESSED THE JURY

Clever Use of Scientific Term Resulted in Acquittal of Lawyer's Client.

The case was one of assault and battery; and one of the witnesses was a local doctor who the prosecuting lawyer proceeded to bully, suggesting that he was prejudiced in favor of the defendant, and had wilfully distorted his evidence in his favor. The doctor denied this, and went on to say that the defendant was suffering from "phalarosa." The word caused a sensation in court, and asked to define the disease, the doctor described it as a sort of chronic disease of an inflammatory nature, which affects certain cranial tissues.
