## DROWNS IN BANGS

### LAKE SATURDAY

Young Man of Chicago Dies in Hole Saturday Evening and is Drowned. Before Help Could Reach Him.

## FIRST DROWNING OF THE YEAR

Had Gone to Wauconda on a Hunting Trip With Friends. The Body Not Recovered Until Tuesday.

Walter Lenzske, a brick layer, 21 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lenzske of 2025 North Paulina, Chicago, was drowned in Bangs at Wauconda, Saturday evening at about 8:30 o'clock.

In company with a party of friends he went to Wauconda on a "hunting" expedition. One of the party had brought a party of skates with him, so they had no sooner arrived at the shores of the lake when Lenzske asked for the skates to go on the lake. He was warned to be careful and not to go alone. After the party had left, Lenzske, who was unarmed, was heard calling for help, several heard him and ran to the shore, but as they got there he called out once more and was silent.

There were two large openings on the far side of the lake from town, and he had not known that he had gone into one of these openings without a sign. Some of the old buildings are covered with trees and bushes.

It was evident that the stockholders were satisfied with the way in which the business had been conducted, and formed a searching party and started to search the body. Sunday evening they returned to Chicago and Monday morning Wauconda, Wauconda, with the body.

The search for the body continued until about 1:30 when the remains were located by El. Li. Stoch of that village in the black mud.

The body was so macerated that his father had difficulty in recognizing him. The body was taken to the hospital, where his services were not required as his son had been found safe.

He leaves in his immediate family to mourn the loss his father, the brother and son and sister.

He died especially as it seems that the young man had believed the ice perfectly safe because he had been told that he had a radio receiver in the house, which he had placed in his mind any question of danger to freeze.

The fact is that the lake is extremely dangerous in the late fortnight, and while safe, in places, remains open, or dangerously thin, over much of the area. The ice is not safe in the vicinity of Wauconda, and it would be safe, after all, if he is just one of the casualties of the ice.
