REFORMERS AND REFORMERS.

Time was when reformer was a man who initiated a great movement for freedom, freedom of thought, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, and other inalienable rights.

He broke the shackles of tyranny, and liberates the people from the manacles of ignorance, knowing that even though his remuneration for his work he would probably be burned alive yet even work usually after from the axis of greater dreams.

Not on every hand with hisses and contumely, he possessed an invincible indifference to popularity, impelled only by heroic convictions, he counted not his own life dear.

Such men were genuine. "Men, whose the last of often don't but but," nor tempt nor applause for gold.

But, alas, reformer today has obviously descended to a mere profession, imitated in some by a glaze for notoriety, and in others by pecuniary considerations.

The latest type of reformer is an individual unopposed by certain "reformers" and "societies" which, instead of gradually educating the public in the craft and craft of "investigation," in the fine art of "muck-raking," if these pseudo-reformers can make a big business, their future is secured.

If they can stir up sufficient agitation to create a demand for some more hastily framed ordinance or legislation, they have achieved what this day and age calls progress.

Therefore their power is limited only by their power to exaggerate facts, misrepresent facts and make a sensation.

When one contemplates the money these reformers (I) receive and spend in dress, in automobiles, Pullman cars, baguette, etc., one marvels at the contrast between the reformer that was and the reformer that is.

Refrains, prohibitions and socialisms is quite the order of the day. There is an abnormal tendency just now to reduce the rights and privileges of the individual and enlarge the functions of the state. The effect is already beginning to appear in the reduction of personality to illiberal dimensions and powers. This abnormal legislative personality will soon have an enlarged role in the life of the individual.

The early part of the nineteenth century was the most corrupt period in all English history. Strangely enough this was the same period when new laws were placed on the Statute books that at any other equal time. But so barren of results were these laws that the "Bastards" of the Revolution of 1848 were the body of reformers whose method and motto was legislation for the sake of law.

It is curious, legislation is only constructive. It can never erect a constructive program. But the destruction of any system, involving legislative action, is the substitution of something better. This is what the ordinary agitator falls to grasp.
