ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL.
Ordinance No. 63 New Series.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON:

Section 1. That for the purpose of carrying out necessary repairs and liabilities of the Village of Barrington for and during the fiscal year ending April 30, 1914, there be appropriated the several sums of money hereunto mentioned and specifically as follows:

For interest on bonded indebtedness..... \$400.00
For repairs of material bonds..... 2,000.00
For paying the necessary salaries and salaries of village officers of said village..... 1,500.00
For maintenance of streets and alleys..... 2,000.00
For salaries..... 1,400.00
For salaries of village officers..... 1,000.00
For work..... 4,500.00

Section 2. That said several sums above mentioned, the aggregate of which is fourteen thousand dollars, be appropriated as follows:

For salaries of village officers..... 1,400.00
For salaries of village officers..... 1,000.00

Section 3. All unexpended appropriations for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1914, are hereby continued for the purpose for which they were made.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be published in the manner provided by law.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.
