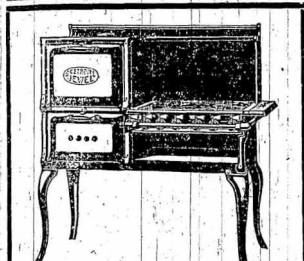

A number of delegates from the Veterans society were returned to Chicago this morning to continue their work at the annual branch show of the Chicago Spanish club.

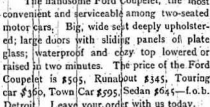

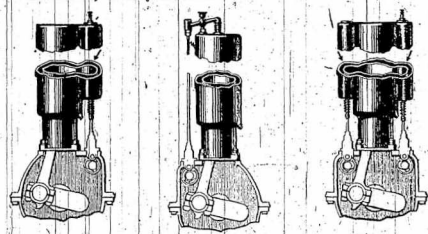

WHAT BUICK "Valve-in-Head" MEANS

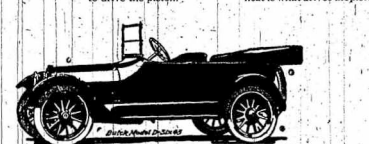
Illustration showing how power is wasted by escaping into unnecessary water jacketed area of the "L" and "T" motor



"L" Head
In this type of motor there is 15 per cent of unnecessary water jacketed space, due to the necessity of water jacketing the valve pocket. This means a 15 per cent loss of heat, which is the same as power.

Valve-in-Head
In this type of cylinder there is an absolute minimum of water jacketed area into which heat, which is the power that drives the piston, can escape. In this type the maximum of heat is saved to drive the piston.

"T" Head
In this type of motor, with 2 valve pockets, there is a 20 per cent loss of heat, due to its escape into the water jacketed area surrounding the valve pockets. This means a 20 per cent loss of power, for heat is what drives the piston.
