OLD RESIDENT DIES MONDAY MORNING AT HOME OF HER SON

Mrs. Katherine Landwehr Succumbs; Two Former Residents Buried Here

Mrs. Katherine Landwehr, for fifteen years a resident of Barrington and its vicinity, died at the home of her son, Edward Landwehr, just south of town, early Monday morning, after suffering for two years with rheumatism, during which time she was a very patient and brave.

Mrs. Landwehr was born at Schale, a village in the state of Prussia, and came to this country in 1861 and settled a farm near Barrington.

After the death of her husband she moved to Elgin, where she resided for a number of years.

At the time she died she was in the home of her son, Edward Landwehr, December 15, 1861, who preceded her in death twenty years.

There were three children born to this union, one dying before birth, one daughter, Mrs. Edward Landwehr, and one son, Edward, as mentioned above.

There are also four sisters, Mrs. H. Elfrink and Mrs. A. H. Landwehr of this place, Mrs. Anna Landwehr, Mrs. John Miller, who live in the west.
