Large Crowd Pays Tribute to Enlisted Men Who Leave Soon For Active Service

Saturday evening, July 28, will long be remembered by the patriotic citizens of Barrington and vicinity.

In the early evening, the blood, quickened the pulse and called forth round round of applause and cheering.

What was it all about? What called hundreds of people from here and there and everywhere to meet in the center of the business district, when a grand and heroic gathering was to be made, the beautiful national colors? Why the strains of martial music, patriotic songs, and men in khaki the marching here and there. Why the faces, those of the boys?

The program, which began near the close of the meeting, was opened by Lieut. George A. Lyon, U. S. A., and he certainly was the man for the job. A better man could not have been found, and his inspiring way he perked blind men's eyes of ceremony, indeed.

After a musical selection by the band, the first speech was introduced in the person of the Rev. Dr. T. Atkey Brewster, of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

From the moment he faced the great throng he rose to the occasion and held the people.

He spoke of the Army of the people, its works and worth. His speech was full of spirit, eloquence and feeling—Americans to the core. He gave full expression to the patriotic spirit of the war—self-defense. The war is out of our seeking. He spoke for the U. S. A., the Red Cross, and the World War, and the boys who are to the soldier boys will be cheered.

Hosts—Lieut. Barrington's wife gave a hearty welcome to the speaker, and he had the feelings of pride within him as he thought of the wonderful response of the young men of the town to the call to arms.

He doubted whether any town of this size could produce its like. It was a most fitting address.

LAKE COUNTY TEACHERS PAY \$700 INTO THE PENSION FUND

Seven Are Now Drawing Pension—Nannie Court of Barrington Is One of This Number

During the last school year teachers in Lake county paid the sum of \$700 into the pension fund with our Government in its foreign policy in prosecuting the war against our enemies, and did not shrink from it. This sum drew out \$2,800 in pension funds. This is according to figures just made in the report of County Superintendent of Schools, Dr. C. C. Stinson to the state department at Springfield.

The report shows that there are 1,612 teachers in Lake county who are contributing to the state pension fund of teachers. During the last year they paid the following amounts:

Ninety-three paid \$5 each; three paid \$10 each; seven paid \$20 each.

Twenty-four paid \$50 each; two teachers who are drawing pensions at the present time are contributing to a pension fund.
