## DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN ITEMS

**Karnie Cull From Events of the Week**  
Or Inferred to That of the People Everywhere.

### Washington

Revocation of President Wilson's power to return military and naval personnel to the United States after their service overseas at any time within 12 months after their discharge has been approved by the bill introduced at Washington by Senator Cummins of Iowa.

After Admiral Nimitz, commanding American forces in the Pacific, informed the navy department at the Italian embassy that the action of the Italian admirals in holding the American flag on the sequester island was due to a misunderstanding and that the Italian commander had apologized and ordered the flag restored.

The house at Washington passed and sent to the senate the bill appropriating \$100,000 for collecting hospitals for disabled soldiers and sailors.

General March, chief of staff at Washington, informed the military committee that dispatches from Europe have been made by American men might be transported home monthly and that all of the American military forces could be returned home and discharged within 12 months.

Debtors of more than \$10,000,000 in the contemplated war expenditures of the war and navy departments have been concerned at the introduction of a bill passed by the house appropriating \$100,000 for collecting hospitals for disabled soldiers and sailors.
