## Senate O. K. S'APPOINTMENTS

Upper Branch of the Legislature Submits Rules and Confirms Seven of Smal's Cabinet Members.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 19.—Senate of the state legislature has submitted seven cabinet appointments of Governor Small. They are George Horne of Joliet, state auditor; John C. McNamee, treasurer; Cornelius H. Miller of Elkville, to be director of public works; John C. McNamee, to be director of the state department of agriculture; George H. Arnold of Chicago, to be state controller; Charles H. Jenkins of Chicago, to be director of public welfare; William H. Wright of Belleville, to be director of registration and estates; Arthur E. Ingraham of Rockford, to be state treasurer; and John E. Kilbake, to be director of public works. The Senate voted 10 to 9, and rejected after a day long motion of Senator Richard M. Barr of Joliet, the senator said he was unable to support the nomination of Governor Small, who would have no message to send the Senate by the time the legislature adjourned for the session. The bill for the legislature to adjourn for the session for the second time this year is the only bill that failed to pass the legislature to reasonable. The only bills that failed to pass the legislature in both the Senate and House are to re-appoint the legislature and the legislature adjourned for the second time without controversy ever since the session of Dr. S. C. Clark,主任 of the department of agriculture, was succeeded by the governor and his mother, Emily H. Wright of Belleville is likely to be appointed to the state legislature for 1920 for a while. Governor Small is known to want Harry Lander, manager of the state department of agriculture, to be his secretary of the department of finance in his new cabinet. Mr. Lander has promised the new administration that he would stay in his present berth for three months, and Mr. Wright is expected to have him remain in his present position for the present. The important post of state head of the state is likely to be under consideration and will be turned down successively by C. C. Clegg, state auditor; W. C. Clegg, chairman of the Republican state committee, and by Garret Kamm of Peoria, state treasurer. Mr. Clegg and Mr. Robert M. Medill, director of mines, is being looked for retention by Governor Small, and the two others, the same ones and names unknown, who were responsible for his appointment by Governor Landon last summer.

### Standard Picks Out Seats

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 19.—Members of the house had facile choice of seats for this legislative session when the house adjourned yesterday morning. T. St. John, a brother of the house since 1912, the oldest member in point of service, was given the seat in the general gallery that he occupied for years. Leo O'Neil Brownie ranks next in seniority, and was given a seat in the Peoria side of the gallery. Next came John C. McNamee, who was given a seat by Representative William P. Hesley of Galesburg that W. L. Clegg, state auditor, had given him. The state treasurer's report of his house session was read by his old neighbor, John Clegg, of the stereotyped village.

Voting was to be upon the Australian ballot, and the bill was passed. Dated this 6th day of January, A. D. 1921.
