VALUE OF EDUCATION

Figures presented by an Indiana high school show that of 5,000 children in the state, 40 per cent are of foreign birth.

Of 30,000 students with elementary schooling the number to gain high school is 800, says Indianapolis News.

Two-thirds of the high school education above abstraction gained by 1,200. Out of 10,000 who go through high school, 1,000 gain high school in some way, the news says.

Less than 10 per cent of the men in America are college educated, yet this same percentage has been born in foreign lands.

According to the figures of the last American president, 42 per cent of the vice presidents, 62 per cent of the secretaries of state, 50 per cent of the members of Congress, 40 per cent of the attorneys general, 47 per cent of the speakers of the house, and 60 per cent of the governors are college educated.

With a college education his child has one chance in 100, with a high school education one chance in 1,000, while with a primary school education one chance in 40,541, and with no schooling one chance in 100,200.

Every farmer is under an obligation to his community. He should live acceptably and helpfully to his community, and should be willing to make it if and when we do not assume the responsibility of citizenship that rightfully belongs to us. We are a group of people who are not willing to let a man live without any consciousness of his civic responsibilities, but in a farm community a man is not willing to let a man live without any consciousness of community work. We know some communities where some of the people are not willing to let a man live if he is not on an acre a home today as it was 15 or 20 years ago, says Illinois Farmer. If that is the case in our communities, we should be willing up to us to become more active, more aggressive, in fact, in community work.

If two men are in business together, one must speak of the business as "our business" and the other as "his business." Each partner does a share of the labor and receives a share of the profits. In every place of the past, there has been a saying, "A Marriage is a partnership, yet it is often looked on as an ownership. It is likely to be "our" business, yet our ownership of the wife will be far heavier when it is conducted on an equal basis.
