

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE BUSY

House Body to Hear Tax Levy Complaints.

SIMILAR PAYER IS THE "GOAT"

No Hope for Lower Income Rates. Hearings Expected to End in Few Days—May Complete Bill Within Two Weeks.

Washington, July 26.—With the tax rate definitely selected, the House Ways and Means Committee on revenue legislation this week will be devoted largely to committee hearings on the various collateral features of the present tax.

The witnesses will include representatives of the various groups affected by present taxes.

Among those who will appear before the committee are the leaders of the business world, who have introduced a bill providing for "spending" as a substitute for present surtaxes, and the leaders of the other bill which will be urged before the committee is the measure introduced by Senator Kelle, Minnesota, which proposes a land tax as a substitute for most of the present taxes.

Will Police Help End Tax?

Members of the committee, however, appear to have made up their minds to insist on further modifications of the bill of the Treasury. Mellon and little consideration will be given to schemes which are not very popular.

The hearings will continue next week. Following the completion of hearings, the committee will send its treasury officials on taxes for the ensuing year. It is hoped to complete the work by the middle of August.

None of the congress leaders are holding out hope now of a reduction in taxes for the next year, however, there will be a readjustment which will lighten the burdens of the people.

By the present of the excess tax and the substitution of an income tax, the committee expected that the difficulties in making tax returns will be substantially lightened.

Nothing for Small Payer.

There is no prospect that the small tax payer will be given any benefits by the present tax. The effect of the adverse action with respect to the sales tax is no possibility of a reduction in the present tax on income.

It is planned to make a committee hearing of the tax in order to see as simply as possible the recommendations of the treasury department that the tax will be followed.

Among those who have not yet appeared before the committee are the members of the National Association of Retail Druggists; H. Archibald Hunt, of the National Association of Banks, and the National Association of Banks.

ASKS WORLD TO AID RUSSIA

Constituent Assembly Body in Paris
↳ Sends a Call for Assistance

Paris, July 22.—An appeal addressed to all nations in the world, seeking that of the 100,000,000 people immediately aid for millions of Russian refugees from famine in the region of the Volga, the Don and territory to the southeast, was issued yesterday by the executive committee of the Russian relief association.

The appeal says that within this territory, which is greater than that of France, 10,000,000 men, women and children of Russian are facing starvation, while their government is too weak to render assistance of any kind.

WHITE BUTCHER AND WIDOW

Request Made of Germany to Furnish Facilities for Moving 10,000 Troops.

Birmingham, Ala., July 26.—G. C. Cooley, forty-five, a butcher, and Mrs. Cooley, his widow, were taken from their houses by masked men, driven about ten miles to the country, and then shot. The butchers, the beating, the refugees drove away and the victims returned to the city. Cooley's widow is now recovering, having to leave the community, but had ignored it.

YANKEE WARSHIPS IN PERU

Arizona, Peru, Arrive at Port of Callao for Annual Celebration.

Lima, Peru, July 26.—The United States battleships Oklahoma and Arizona have arrived at Callao harbor, having been sent by the government to attend the Peruvian independence day celebration of its independent ally. Spain, which had been in recent battles, while 18 nations sent special embassies and 18 others were special delegations.
