Henry Berlin

Henry Berlin, aged 66 years, 1 month and 3 days, retired, died at his home on Hough street at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, after an illness of several years' duration. Death was due to a complication of heart disease and dropsy. He had been troubled with his heart for a number of years. When dropsy set in a year ago he became virtually an invalid, and although everything that medical science could accomplish was done for him, it became apparent that he could not live long.

Mr. Berlin was born Oct. 24, 1851, in Palestine township. He was baptised and confirmed, in the First Grove church, and was married there to Louise Henschel in Barrington township May 13, 1883. They became the parents of six children, five of whom are dead. Mr. Berlin cultivated a farm in Barrington township for many years before he married, retiring and moving to this village 4 years ago on account of poor health.

Besides the sorrowing widow and four daughters, Lillian, Minnie, Esther and Elizabeth, he is survived by three brothers, Charles and John of Tripoli, Ill., and William of Palatka township and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Dammenda, Denver, Jo, Mrs. Fred Mundrake, Elgin, and Mrs. Henry Wagner, New Salem, Mo. He has in addition a large number of relatives, many of whom live to this community.

The funeral will be held tomorrow at 11:30 p. m. at the home and

at 2 o'clock in St. Paul's church. Rev. Herman Tietke will officiate. Interment will be in Evergreen cemetery.
