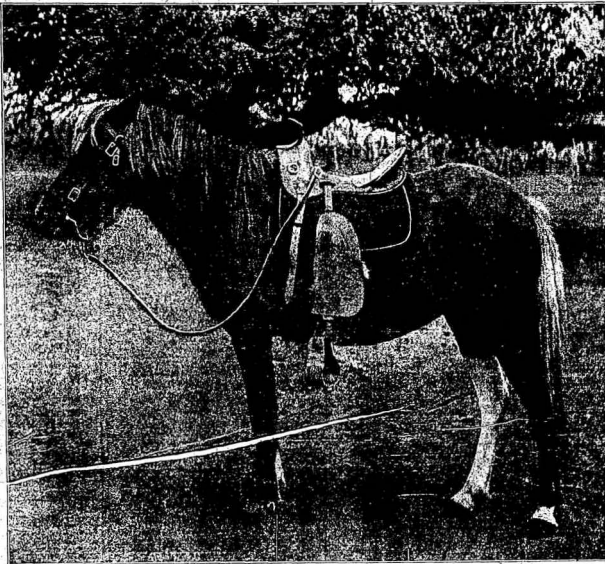

INDIAN SUMMER

There is an old saying, "Never the Indian summer until after the square winter."
