

St. Anne's Plans Parochial School for Barrington

St. Anne's church at Effingham has been selected as the site for a parochial school which will be built in Barrington. Ground for the school will be broken in March and the building will be completed by September 1.

St. Anne's holds regular ground meetings for the purpose of raising funds to accommodate a school building. All grades from kindergarten up and music will be taught by sisters of one of the teaching orders. The school will be open to all children regardless of religious affiliation.

All Church Practice

In discussing the matter this week, Rev. John A. Duffley, pastor of St. Anne's, said it is the invariable practice of the church to have a school wherever it is possible and that the church is not a financial institution. (Not only are there about fifty churches in the St. Anne's parish; of school are but in addition the archdiocese of Chicago has a school.)

U.S. Supreme Court

Washington, D. C.—A decision rendered by the United States Su-

The suit was against the county treasurer, the plaintiff being the Hanover Life Insurance Company of New York.

The question at issue was whether a levy on the net proceeds of a foreign insurance company was an unfair discrimination in favor of domestic companies.

The Inquirer company held that it was unfair, and the Supreme Court, reversing a ruling of the Illinois Supreme Court, took the Hanover company's viewpoint.

The original action the Hanover company sought to obtain the county

recovered from trying to collect \$10,000 under the state insurance law of 1930. But many other claims are involved.
