## THE SENATE QUEEN

The political eye is most concerned on Maine where next Monday an election is held to fill a vacancy in the United States Senate. The state is safely Republican and presumably the candidate of that party, Arthur R. Gould, will be named.

The next general election in April, March 28, will bring from next month the regular session, stands practically even but with a Republican Senator from Maine and "up" in the way of patronage to the "Independents," it is regarded as a foregone conclusion that it will be organized by the Republicans. After the organization, which means naming the committee chairmen and committee members, will go to the Senate to vote on the individual members. It thus turns out that so-called party measures put forward by the administration are by no means certain of becoming law.

The Smith-Vaughn fight in the Senate may be precipitated before March 4 because of the serious illness of Senator William B. McKinley of this state. It is known that Gov. Law will be unable to go to Washington to the possible McKinley vacancy. This would precipitate the Smith fight and would be an important feature of the effort session. Smith's vote on legislative matters would be necessary to the administration and for this reason he will get strong support from administration senators. Many lawyers believe that the Senate will accept to accept Smith if he goes to Washington as an opposite of George Smeal. His appointment would be regular and it would seem that the question of primary money and its source should not enter into the case. In fact, there is a very serious question raised as to the right of the Senate to reject anyone a state senator to Washington. Neither is it certain that the Smith-Vaughn unfairly elected and neither has sought to go behind the ballot. The statement that the Senate has the power to reject or to throw out Smith does not alter the sovereign right of the people of Illinois to choose its representatives to the national legislature. It is only a matter of a few years ago that we will repeat itself and the old idea of "State's Rights" in a new guise will again become paramount.

## SIGNS OF PROGRESS

Again to Barrington's breast, there swells indelible hope. A word of cheer has come. The village board has gone far as to name a committee consisting of Messers. Koehler, Rieke, and Nightingale to select street signs. A limited specimen have been shown, there are a limited number of signs to be put up, and eventually will serve the purpose of marking the streets and guiding strangers and letter carriers. These harbinger of hotel, clearly-named streets all have shown the village board and there ought to be no material differences in a selection. The marker at the corner of Hough and Main Streets is placed in the center of the road, in theistic standards of the board. In orange and black, noted by sign painters as the cardinal colors of visibility, it will certainly mark the way.

"In the beginning," said Cicero, "the world was so mad that certain signs come before certain events. We would like very much to have perfectly marked in this matter. Where there are now signs, surely there soon should follow specifications, the letting of a contract and the purchase of a dozen signs, if that many are needed."

The sign is important because it points the way, not necessarily the way home, it need not be feared, but the way to better things for Barrington.
