## CADETS AND MIDNIES THE

America loves the cadets and the midnies. Its affections are tied to them. In

time of war they constitute the nucleus of our defense, our only safeguard from foreign domination. It is natural that the football game last Saturday testimony.

If either team had won the better it would have been a grand finale. When both teams are fully prepared, as they have been on three occasions, the game is always a tie and will continue to be so. When West Point or Annapolis won the one merely got the worst of the break—something not likely to happen again as Saturday days are now concluded.

Not only was the game regarded by experts as the best of the season but it brought out the largest crowd, estimated at 11,000 and drawn from national, state and city officials and friends of the cadets. It was never seen in the public mind for over a week, in fact, since Congressman Breitman of Illinois succeeded in winning the Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy to the view of holding the spectacle in the west this year. It was the first time the midnies as an organization ever came west. The games were spread over three weeks at the Chicago exposition in 1893.

The two schools represent a standard that is unsurpassed in the United States both in scholarship and training. The cadets are rugged, individualistic and unique by unit of their civilian life that is only as it should be, the presumption being that men who enter will remain in the service.
