ILLINOIS SEIZES HER OPPORTUNITY

Whether it was Lincoln who said it, or Barren, makes little difference. No true adage has ever spoken.

VANISHING INDIANS

It has long been the popular belief that the Noble Red Man is dying out, and that it is only a question of time when the American Indian will disappear from the face of the earth.

But according to the United States Commissioner of Indian Affairs, the number of Indians in the United States has steadily increased since 1887, when the race reached its lowest number since the discovery of America.

There is one kind of Indian, however, which has been unmistakably marked for extinction, comparatively if not absolutely. This is the Wooden Indian which once roamed the prairies, greedily the great stores of the country.

For several years one of these wooden aquas has been owned by Henry Ford and included among his vast assortment of relics of a bygone day. Recently, Mr. Ford secured a mask for his solitary square, when he purchased the "John Bull" mask, now owned by Arnold Root of Tiffin, O., a half century ago.

Among wooden Indians exhibited in Cleveland recently, "Sene-Caw" was deemed to be the largest and finest specimen of his vanishing race, and he was awarded a \$500 premium. In Indianapolis he exhibited a mask of that of Aban Bed Adhene, and all the rest. But, although he has a mate, we may hardly expect to see "his tribe increase."

A RANK INJUSTICE

An example of the stubbornness of government bureaucracy is seen in the persistence with which the Post Office Department clings to its practice of competing with local printers in the sale of printed envelopes at least cost.

There is no more justification for this practice than there would be for selling clothing groceries, or any other commodity at less than cost, and making up the deficit by taxation.

Still, every administration, whether Republican or Democratic, has effectively resisted every attempt to put an end to this unfair and indefensible proceeding.

Local printers object to the sale of plain stamped envelopes or their bearing the return address of the post office, with a blank line for the name to be written in. They do object to the printing of individual return addresses practically for nothing, the expense being from the post office.

It is not difficult to understand why local printers protest against this practice.

They ask no favors from the government. They merely protest against the rank injustice of a policy which singles them out for a species of discrimination not employed against other citizens and taxpayers.

AIDING FARM WOMEN

In a recent bulletin of the United States Department of Agriculture a striking illustration of the benefits of labor-saving machinery on the farm and in the home was given.

Among the devices particularly recommended by the department is the power washing machine, which is doing so much to afford the farm women relief from the drudgery which has heretofore fallen to her.

By inducing an Ohio woman to wear a pedometer, a device which registers the number of steps taken and thus the number of miles walked, it was found that with an electric washer and iron, and running water in the home, she performed the weekly washing and ironing with only four and a half miles of walking. Without this equipment she would have walked nearly 12 miles, to say nothing of the time lost in carrying water.

Another discussion involving certain fine points with regard to washing machines has been carried on in the editorial circles of Washington, where Daniel Ryan, a tireless businessman, was charged with spiking his wife.

The thing which made Ryan most tired was the fact that his wife had been "keeping bad company." Remonstrances at divers and sundry times having failed to convince her of the error of her ways, he proceeded to spank her soundly, but in the seduction of that.

The magistrate who tried the case declared that under the law it was imperative that he find Ryan guilty, but added that personally he felt that the lady's chastisement was deserved. Ministers and other judges have also submitted their views to the court which is to hear the case in individual detail. Most of those sides with the wife, but one judge thought that Ryan showed great consideration by not spanking her in public.

We venture no opinion in the matter, but may at least congratulate Mr. and Mrs. Ryan on their refraining from the American habit of using firearms in settling family affairs.

SPARE THE BIRDS

Although some varieties of birds are considered a great nuisance by farmers and others, it is doubtful that any of these feathered tribes are more destructive than the others.

Birds are the natural enemies of insects, and insects are the greatest enemies of mankind. Scientists have declared that without continued research and the employment of improved means of combating insect pests would be the death of the world and destroy all other life, including man.

The rapidity with which certain insects multiply is beyond the imagination. For example, a pair of pueras, a species of flies, will in a year produce more than 441 quadrillion young. One small bird, such as a titmouse, will destroy 1,500 of these a day. The house sparrow, which eats 20,000 insects a day, will eat 100,000 insects in a year. Various birds have their favorite spots upon which they prey, but all eat practically any insect which crosses their path.

With this ever present menace of insects to combat, we can hardly have too many birds. Not only out of humane sentiment, but as an actual protection to civilization, the birds should be spared.
