PURE MILK GROUP MAKES RAPID STRIDES IN CHICAGO DISTRICT

More than half of the fluid milk supply now going to the Chicago market is controlled by the Pure Milk Association by the end of June, according to figures received from the association in Chicago.

More than 600 dairymen already are members in Kane county where dairymen were in control in 1926, and by the end of June had made considerable progress in the Chicago territory.

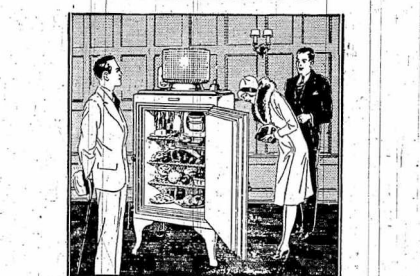
