Water Problem Confronts Every Growing Village

The existing waterworks at Harrington was originally installed in 1898 and subsequently additional equipment added. Except for that equipment, using electric power instead of steam, the present waterworks today represent practically the same as the original installation, thirty years ago. The present waterworks plant and source of supply are inadequate to supply the minimum future demands, and consequently do not secure reasonable fire protection.


LAKE COUNTY LADS ATTEND FAIR SCHOOL

CHEMISTS AD FARMER

Farmers would do well to look to the chemist rather than to the politician, for relief from the present unsatisfactory state of agriculture, according to speakers at a recent institute held by the American Chemical Society.

By devising means whereby hitherto wasted products of the farm may be turned into useful commodities, the chemist can add much to the farmer's income, but the possibilities in this line have been only fairly comprehended by the farmer.

Oat hulls can be transformed into furniture, cornstarch into artificial silk, sugar cane into lumber, and so on. Purified cotton linters now bring about 200 cents a pound and other articles, is a by-product of the oat crop which was unknown 25 years ago, but one breakfast food company claims to have now shipped 200 tons of oatmeal to be converted into furfural.

In order to handle many of these waste products profitably, new types of machinery are being developed, and the farmer is working with increasing success toward the end sought.

The utilization of waste farm products and the development of new markets for the surplus of the farm are the great program for agriculture of the future.

CAUSES OF CRIME

In their efforts to find an explanation for the increasing prevalence of crime many thoughtful persons have concluded that the tendency to burden the public with a growing responsibility of crime is a result of the lack of the lawlessness which now prevails.

Speaking before an international conference of police chiefs at Colorado Springs, Dr. Charles Simon said: "The limit of what we as human beings can do is to create an environment in which the normal balance of individual feelings that he is oppressed and will seek relief from by expressing his personality."

Through the operation of innumerable laws and the activities of government agencies employed thereon are restricted, imposed, and enforced, and the result is caused many unnecessary annoyances which are resented by a people who live freedom.

If more attention were paid to apprehending and punishing real criminals, while allowing greater freedom from harassment to respectable citizens, we should doubtless have a more law-abiding and happier citizenship.

WORKMAN ON BOARD

Earning his living as a lathe operator in a Cincinnati plant, Ole Snyder also sits on the board of directors of the company and takes a hand in running the affairs. Board meetings are over he goes back to his lathe.

This peculiar arrangement is made possible by the fact that the Dreyfus & Company, doing a gross yearly business of more than \$190,000,000, has three directors representing its employees, who vote equal with the capitalistic members of the board, of whom there are nine.

Employees now own 46,000 shares of the company's stock, with a total value of more than \$11,000,000, of which they received \$700,000 in profits last year.

The custom of encouraging employees to own stock in the company, which has been in vogue for many years, is spreading rapidly during the past few years. It not only promotes thrift among them, but makes them more interested in the success of the enterprise in which they are real partners.

TALKING PICTURES SPREAD

At the present time the rapid spread of talking motion pictures is almost sensational. Already more than 400 theaters in this country are equipped with reproducing apparatus and it is believed that nearly 1,000 will be so equipped by the end of the year, as contracts for installing such installations have already been made.

The response of the public to this newest amusement has been very gratifying, in spite of the summer heat. One New York

theatre took in \$76,000 in a week and another receipts were \$106,000 in a similar period.

Another development making rapid strides is that of motion pictures in natural colors. With action, color and sound, the picture film of the future will closely approximate the original performance and reproduces. All this, combined with the radio, will bring to people everywhere a class of entertainment heretofore available to only a favored few in the metropolitan centers.

RUSSIAN HEROES

Exploits of the heroic crew of the Russian ice-breaker Krasin, which saved several scores of the Novik expedition and the relief party, laboring against tremendous odds, have excited world-wide praise.

This gallant feat has even tended to foster the feelings of many foreign to the Soviet government, whose flag the Krasin flew. But the heroism of the Russians was not due to the fact that they were of the Soviets, but in spite of it.

What a pity that a potentially great people should have their aspirations repressed and their heroisms despised by the operation of a Communist government, administered by cruel and selfish masters.

CANADIAN BOY STAR

It fell to the lot of Percy Williams, a Canadian schoolboy, to prove the outstanding track star of the Olympic Games in Amsterdam by winning both the 100-meter and 200-meter sprints, a feat not hitherto accomplished since 1912, when Craig of the University of Michigan did the trick.

Williams incidentally wrestled both championships from the United States and proved his undoubted superiority over a formidable array of European and American champions. His showing was uniformly brilliant throughout preliminaries and finals.

The combined time it took him to win both short events was less than 35 seconds, yet the effort he put forth in that brief period lifted him from obscurity to world-wide fame as an athlete.
