

## CHEMISTS AID FARMERS

Farmers would do well to look to the chemist, rather than to the politician, for relief from the present unsatisfactory state of agriculture, according to speakers at a recent institute held by the American Chemical Society.

By devising means whereby hitherto wasted products of the farm may be turned into useful commodities, chemistry has already done much toward increasing the farmer's income, but the possibilities in the respect have not been fully comprehended by the layman.

Oil can be transformed into furniture, cornstarch into artificial silk, sugar cane bagasse into lumber, and so on. Furfural used in the making of radio panels, electric light sockets and other articles is a by-product of the east, which was imported 15 years ago, but now breakfast food companies alone in Iowa now ship 200 tons of east daily to be converted into furfural.

In order to handle many of these waste products profitably, new types of machines must be devised, but engineers are constantly working with increasing success toward the end sought.

The application of waste farm products and the development of new markets for the commodities thus obtained hold great promise for agriculture of the future.

## CAUSES OF CRIME

In their efforts to find an explanation for the increasing prevalence of crime, social workers have concluded that the tendency to burden the public with a growing multiplicity of laws may account for much of the lawlessness which now prevails.

Speaking before an international convention of police chiefs at Colorado Springs, Dr. Carlton Simon said: "We can hardly have any hope of controlling crime if we do not even the normally balanced individual feel that he is oppressed and will seek unlawful means of expressing his personality."

Through the operation of innumerable laws and the activities of government agencies employed thereunder we are restricted in our freedom of action, and this has caused many unnecessary annoyances which are resented by a people who love freedom.

If more attention were paid to apprehending and punishing real criminals, while allowing greater freedom from harassment to respectable citizens, we should doubtless have a more law-abiding and happier citizen ship.

## WORKMAN ON BOARD

Earning his living as a labor operator in a Cincinnati plant Otto Snyder also sits on the board of directors of the company and takes a hand in running its affairs. When board meetings are over he goes back to his lathe.

This peculiar arrangement is made possible by the fact that the Pittsburgh Steel Company, doing a gross yearly business of more than \$190,000,000, has three directors representing its employees, with voice and vote equal with the capitalistic members of the board, of whom there are nine.

Even though now over 60,000 shares of the company's stock are held by men of more than \$11,000,000, in fact they have received \$700,000 in profits last year.

The custom of encouraging employees to own stock in the corporation for which they work has spread rapidly during the past few years, not only to promote "thrift" among them, but makes them more interested in the success of the enterprise in which they are real partners.

## TALKING MOVIES SPREAD

At the present time the rapid spread of talking motion pictures is almost sensational. Already more than 400 theaters have been equipped with reproducing apparatus and it is believed that nearly 1,000 will be so equipped by the end of the year, so contracts for additional installations have already been made.

The response of the public to this newest amusement device has been very gratifying, in spite of the summer heat. One New York

theatre took in \$76,000 in a week and another's receipts were \$106,000 in a similar period.

Another development making rapid strides is that of motion pictures in natural colors. With action, color and sound, the picture film of the future will closely approximate the stage picture in quality. All this, combined with the radio, will bring to people everywhere a class of entertainment heretofore available to only a favored few in the metropolitan centers.

## RUSSIAN HEROES

Exploits of the heroic crew of the Russian ice-breaker "Krasin," which saved several members of the Noble expedition and their relatives, are described as tremendous. They have exacted a heavy price.

This gallant fleet has even tended to soften the feelings of many toward the Soviet government, whose flag the Krasin flew. But the heroism of the Russians was not due to the fact that they were of the Soviets, but rather to the spirit in which they performed their duty. They have preserved their generous impulses in view of the long oppression which they have undergone and caused add cause for admiration.

What a pity that such a potentially great people should have their aspirations repressed by a government which, through the operation of a Communistic government, administered by cruel and selfish masters,

## CANADIAN BOY STAR

It fell to the lot of Perry Williams, a Canadian schoolboy, to prove the outstanding track star of the Olympic Games in Amsterdam by winning the 100-meter and 200-meter sprints, a feat no other has accomplished since 1912, at Craig of the University of Michigan did the trick.

Williams incidentally wrested both championships from the United States and proved his undisputed superiority over a formidable galaxy of sprinting stars representing many nations. His showing was uniformly brilliant throughout preliminaries and finals.
