Persons who can qualify under that definition are truly American, whether native-born or naturalized.

AN UNSEEN DANGER

With the approach of winter, the usual fatalities from deadly carbon monoxide may be expected, unless motorists heed warnings against starting their motors in closed garages.

So many deaths have been caused by this poisonous gas that U. S. Bureau of Mines has produced a motion picture to illustrate its dangers. The film is to be shown to all mechanics who have to illuminate their engines by carbon monoxide, the picture displays these warnings: "Never run the engine in a closed garage." "Keep the doors

wide open." "Never get under the car while the engine runs." "Never sleep in a room with a gasoline appliance burning."

Carbon monoxide is an odorless and therefore dangerous gas. It is a silent killer, its victim not even aware of its presence, and it is fatal unless respiration and a supply of oxygen is immediately applied.

WANTED TO BE FOOLED

They gained admittance to a private club in a small town near Paris to witness a session where an alleged spiritualistic medium was schooled to "read" the dead.
