TO PIONEER MONTHS

This month the 12 of 12 states plus along the National Old Trail Road in memory of the mothers of pioneer days will be unveiled at Bethesda, Md., with ceremonies by officials of the transcontinental highway and the Department of the Interior.

Eleven of these states have already been placed, each in a different state. Each represents a pioneer mother holding a babe in her arms and with a small boy clinging to her skirts, the name being inscribed: "Madonna of the Trail: N. S. D. A. Memorial to the Pioneer Mothers of the Covered Wagon Days."

The figure, of the women in ten foot high, standing on a six foot base, all of pink complexion, the 12 statues being identical, except for different wording of the inscription relating to the locality in which it is placed.

These statues, which were erected by the D. A. R., are a most fitting memorial to heroic deeds of a by-gone era. Their courage and self-sacrificing toil contributed so much to the building of a great nation.

PLANE UNITES FAMILY

A PAIR OF BABY SHOES

Among the resources in the Canadian archives at Ottawa are a pair of baby shoes once worn by James Wolfe. Most American school children have read in their histories the story told of how General Wolfe recited Gray's "Elegy in a Churchyard" which he wrote before the battle of Quebec and said that he had rather have been the author of that poem than to have "this glory of being the French tomorrow."

He did beat the French on the morrow on the Plains of Abraham at Quebec, which victory wrested Canada from the French, but Wolfe died on the field after being thrice wounded. The opposing French commander, Montcalm, was also mortally wounded in the battle.

Wolfe was one of the most skillful and daring commanders who ever wore the British uniform. He was a commissioned officer at the age of 14, became a captain at 17 and a major shortly thereafter. He was in general with the British at the battle of the Plains of Abraham at the age of 31, after executing one of the most daring exploits in military annals.

It was at that battle that Wolfe died, but late here, but if our readers will look it up they will understand why that pair of baby shoes is so highly prized and treasured by the Dominion authorities in Ottawa.

BARRON ON CRIME

In a recent address, Clarence Barron, the celebrated criminal lawyer, said that the increase of laws against personal property was responsible for a large percentage of the increase in crime in this country.

"We are in the midst of the most reactionary period this country has experienced since the Civil War," Mr. Barron said, "with the laws being tightened in an effort to jail the guilty as to endanger the innocent."

"Probably a quarter of the persons now confined in the prison bars are confined for offenses in crime that were not considered crimes 15 years ago."

A great part of this modern movement to curb liberty, which he called "a wave of the law," Mr. Barron said, is caused by fanatic reform organizations.

Mr. Barron speaks strong words, but one with a knowledge of modern legislation can only say that the law has been all over the world's movement to control and rule against the individual, under the guise of "reform," and the result has been a reaction against the law and authority that is causing a crime record to mount to dizzy heights.
